Innovative solutions were found to meet all challenges, and the program culminated with an enthralling webinar in which the same three alumni speakers who spoke at the Symposium last year returned to receive questions and reflections on the themes presented from their keen and curious students.

Our thanks again to our special panel comprising Julia Cornwall McKean, Ben Volkering and Lt Col Pingham Chua for their inspiring contributions. The program was duly nominated for a City of Melbourne special award to recognise the work of JLP2020 and its new virtual delivery mode that was initiated in response to the COVID19 lockdown.

The Mentoring Program was also severely affected by the interruptions to school life this year. Planning has already commenced for 2021 with a campaign for new mentors to be launched in Term 4. The valued contributions of mentors will be even more appreciated in these times of growing uncertainty and difficulty that awaits all students in the near future.



History Notes

Dedman Walking

Ivo Alfred Gibson (MHS 1918) was secretary of the Liberal Party Branch in Geelong (the seat of Corio) and was sued for defamation by the Labor Member, Mr Dedman, for 10,000 pounds (later doubled), due to an ad he authorised, which claimed Mr Dedman would create a socialist state, not allowing working men to own their own home. Dedman lost his seat at the next election before the hearing and the case after it. Ivo was also Secretary of the Geelong Cricket and Football Club from 1940-1955.

An Accidental Meeting

Dr Roy Nettleton (MHS 1918-1920) was driving on the Princes Highway beyond Orbost in 1934 when he collided with another vehicle. As the two drivers alighted, an altercation was imminent when Roy recognised the other driver as Mr Bunting, a member of the Papuan Legislative Council, who he knew when he was Government Medical Officer in New Guinea. Roy towed his re-discovered friend's car back to Orbost for repairs.

CJ Dennis

In the last newsletter I wrote an article about CJ Dennis. Another connection has arisen, Edna Amy Morcom started in the 1932 film of The Sentimental Bloke (previously filmed in 1919, the 1932 was the first talkie version), in the minor roles of Artie and Effie. Edna was a student at the school in 1919 and performed in a number of radio plays in the 1920's and 1930's before she married in 1936.

Unlucky Tram

Jessie Eleanor Emms MHS 1921 when waiting for a tram outside St Pauls on 3 May 1926, had her purse picked from her handbag. The thief though had no use for Ms Emms' 1st Class ticket to Sydney (by train of course), and so dropped them in the Tourist Bureau letter box, where they were returned to Ms Emms in time for her holiday.


Archibald / Wynne Prizes

A further Archibald Prize and Wynne Prize MHS connection has turned up. Arthur Thomas Challen MHS 1925-1926 was a finalist in the Archibald Prize in 1936 with portraits of Edward Best, Esq. and of Mrs G. D. Kelly, in 1937 of Sir E Cunningham and 1952 with a self-portrait. He also was a finalist for the Wynne Prize with his painting Barrier Reef in 1952.



Sound Cover

Reginald Ralph Pilkington MHS 1920 (below) like a number of MHS students completed the medical course at Melbourne University, though he took longer than most, not finishing until 1937 when he was 32.



The delay was caused though not from any problems with studies, but rather due to various criminal escapades, including as a child, escaping from custody, larceny, Robbery Under Arms and lastly blowing a safe at a railway station in Queensland (sentenced to 4 years imprisonment in 1925).

He did show some Melbourne High ingenuity, as when blowing the safe, he waited for a passing express train to help deaden the sound though this was insufficient, and he was caught.



Poacher Turned Gamekeeper?

A contemporary of Reginald, Nathan Wynne MHS 1920 (below), also had a long criminal history (larceny, unlawful assault, fraud) and managed to add 10 years to his age.



He was released from prison in May 1939 and joined the army 6 months later (though not before his wife divorced him for desertion). He saw service in the Middle East and New Guinea, in the Provost Corps (military police), though he was court martialled several times for minor offences. He was back before the criminal courts in 1948, though the papers did not report the charges. He died on Remembrance Day in 1965.

Keeping it in the Family

We often hear of children following their parents' careers, but for the Mason family, the siblings followed each other.

The two boys both joined the E.S.& A. Bank, Arthur Ernest MHS 1924-1925 and Donald Sydney MHS 1926-1928. The two girls became pharmacists, Lilian May MHS 1920-1923 in Launceston and Phyllis Estelle MHS 1923-1925 in Orbost.

For the Stanton twins (Roy Alan Julian Stanton MHS 1929-1932 and Gordon Victor Stanton MHS 1929-1932) they both studied medicine and were doctors in Perth.





Making Waves

Grace Eliza Conole MHS 1921-1922 was nearly the youngest Royal Life Saving Society Diploma winner in 1924 at 17, but she didn't pass. Instead she was successful the following year. Her younger sister, Amelia Christina Conole MHS 1923 assisted by being rescued.

Active at the South Port/Albert Park Life Saving Club, she competed and coached swimming for a number of years. In 1947 she taught 338 school pupils swimming in the summer campaign.

She completed her Diploma of Physical Education and both a teacher with the Victorian Education Department and an instructor at Melbourne University.

Eager to Enlist

On 30 January 1937, Frederick John Wridgway MHS 1921-1922 another pilot were in a Blackburn-Bluebird Biplane that went into a spin and crashed. They both survived the impact but died shortly afterwards.

Reports suggest that this was a not uncommon event with this model of plane. His death did not stop him serving in WWII, when he appropriately enlisted with the R.A.A.F.. Presumably this was his elder brother, who would have known his details and had access to his birth certificate and wanted to drop his age to be able to enlist.

This is not the only known instance. Monty Super MHS 1933-1937 was struck and killed by a car whilst at a tram stop on St Kilda Road in 1939. He enlisted in the Army, though it was actually his younger brother Albert Benzion Super MHS 1935-1939 who was only 17 but used his brother's identity (with an added year to Monty's age) to enlist.

A Different View

An interesting element of the World War Two Dossiers held by the National Archives of Australia are the photos on file. Whilst most are the formal front and side on photos, it would appear that enlisting service personal would provide their own photo.

Thus we have a photo of Keith Henry Cottman in his garden with his dog. Usually these photos are only in family collections, and so rarely accessible to the public. Keith attended MHS 1925-1927 and was an Accountant with I.C.I. for many years. He was a Pilot Officer in the R.A.A.F. Reserve in 1940. Alan Edward Claud Hughes MHS 1925 provided not just one, but three variations for his formal enlistment photo.

Early Notice

Lyndley Dawson Craven MHS 1926-1927 joined the R.A.A.F. and he was engaged to W.A.A.A.F. (Women's Auxiliary RAAF) Constance Elizabeth "Betty" Serrell before he departed to Africa for further training.

Part of Betty's duties was to decode incoming signals, one of which was notification to R.A.A.F. HQ in Melbourne of Lyndley's death in a flying accident in Kenya on 13 July 1942.

A similar occurrence occurred when Austin George Durst MHS 1929-1931 was ferrying a new Catalina Flying Boat from Hawaii to Australia. His plane disappeared after it last reported in 120 miles East North East of New Caledonia on 4 February 1944.

Two years previous he had married Kathleen Georgina Wilson, and her sister was in the R.A.A.F. in the signals area, and thus received news of Austin's disappearance.

Back to the Castle on the Hill

In 1948 Jack William Osborne charged with thefts from both Melbourne High School and Mac.Rob. It was an inside job though, as he was a student MHS 1935-1936.

School Plays from the Past

Term three would usually be the time for the school play, something not possible in this year of COVID-19. Fortuitously two images of plays from brighter years have recently arrived, both from the pre-Opera era when plays were the main theatrical event. Today there is a musical early in the year, still referred to as an Opera as when they started in 1960 they would usually be a Savoy Opera.

The play would usually be in August and the records in the archives has 1957 as the first year when one major play was performed (See How They Run) rather then several shorter plays. The CJ Breen Memorial House Competition had both a musical and a drama component, with each house performing a one act play, which continued until about the 1970's.



The picture above is from 1938 showing the cast and set of *The Pied Piper*. The set was made of paper painted by teacher Don Webb in bright colours and was described as elaborate. The Pied Piper and his drummer have covered the highlight of the set, described in *The Unicorn* as:

"The central arch opened on a red stone quay, behind which was the Weser, a beautiful sky-blue colour. The river was crowded with fishing smacks with multi-coloured sails, and green hills rose on its opposite bank."



School Plays from the Past (con't)

The Pied Piper was unable to combine acting and musical abilities, so an off-stage flautist was used. Don's son sent through the photo (see also the previous Newsletter for an article about his Archibald Prize entry).

The image to the right is from 1952 of the Moliere play, *The Would-Be Highbrows*.

This was part of the Drama nights run by Eric Meehan, of three plays and three musical numbers by the School Orchestra. Moliere was a favourite with performances of his plays Le Bourgeois Gentilhomme and L'Avare in 1925 and 1926. The closing event was very traditional, but with a major change, when God Save the Queen was played.

Both images follow the Elizabethan tradition of only male actors, including for the female roles, a tradition kept up for many years until joint productions with a girls' school started.

We look forward to the return of the School Play next year.

Lila Isobel Madden

The Archives have received a generous offer to donate Lila Isobel Madden's school badge on the Centenary of her finishing at MHS. Her grandson, Bradley Fenner, who is now Principal of Prince Alfred College in Adelaide has offered the badge, along with details of his grand-mother and scans of two family photos.

Lila was born in Heathcote in 1903 and start at Melbourne High School in 1917. In 1920 after completing her Leaving Certificate, she joined the Department of Education as a teacher, a career she followed for 44 years.

Whilst at school she played Tennis, including a trip to Ballarat, where MHS defeated Ballarat High School 44 to 33 games. She also a photographer, with her photo of the Goulburn Weir published in Ours in July 1920.



Lila Isobel Madden (con't)

Her first teaching post was to Glendaruel State School, about 10 kilometres southwest of Clunes in central Victoria. In 1928 she married a local farmer, James (Jim) Stewart Branigan of 'The Pines', now 'Beckworth Retreat'. They had three children, Henry (Harry) James 1929-77, Lynette (Bradley's mother) 1930-2015 and Rodney Stewart 1933-.

She taught locally for many years to supplement farm income and in her later years, after Jim's death in 1960 she divided her time between the farm and a holiday house in Torquay. She died in Clunes on the 8 September 1986.

Lila and Jim's farm is now Beckworth Retreat, with accommodation for hire, with one of the cottages named after Lila.




Radio Days

The Stonnington History Collection recently received a donation of an Amateur Radio Licence that was issued to Frederick Kenneth McTaggart in 1949. Ken as he was known, was a student at Melbourne High School from 1931-1936, where he was involved with the Orchestra, and was its leader in 1934. He was also a Prefect in 1935 and in the Forrest House Debating Team.

His interest in Radio was noticeable in his involvement in the Wireless Club, of which he was Vice-President. He designed a simple self-build radio set, which he called the "MHS Twin" and signed off with his call sign, VK3NSW, the same as his licence held by Stonnington History Centre.

After leaving MHS, Ken completed his Doctor of Science and worked for the C.S.I.R.O. Ken died in 2004.



Radio Days (con't)

Another former student interested in radio was Otto Holst MHS 1922-1924, who received his first licence (call sign VK3BY) at the end of WWI, before coming to MHS.

To improve his radio transmissions, Otto erected a 105-foot Douglas Fir Radio Mast in 1930 in his parent's back garden at 27 Bambra Road, which was still standing at the time of Otto's death in 1967.

Otto and his brother installed the Herald Newspaper's Radio Station (3DB) system, connecting various entertainment venues in the city, with the Herald Building, and to their Transmitter at Ashburton.

In 1931 he also installed the Melbourne Town Hall Public Address System, of which much use was made by the school over the years with various Speech Night's and other events. Otto continued to maintain and operate it until his death.

Another old boy with an interest in radio was Alvin Clive Thornton MHS 1923-1924, though his interest had less fortunate consequences, when he was convicted of using wireless equipment without a Broadcasting licence in 1933 in Adelaide for which he was fined £2.10
