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### Vale - Dr Graeme Ivallan Duke



The MHSOBA mourns the death of Dr Graeme Ivallan Duke, teacher at MHS from 1961 until his retirement in 1986. An outstanding and innovative educator, a brilliant Vice Principal who showed skill as an administrator, wisdom and humanity.

Much loved by students and staff. Our condolences to his family. He truly Honoured the Work.

Dr Graeme Ivallan Duke, B.A.(Hons.), Dip.Ed., D.D. 7 July 1926 - 18 December 2021 MHS Staff 1961-1986

Graeme Duke was born into a Methodist family and won a scholarship to Wesley College.

He then went to the University of Melbourne where he completed an Honours Arts degree and was a student of Queens College. He was an excellent scholar gaining honours in French and Ancient History, and a first-class honour in Latin.

He then completed his Dip Ed and in 1947 joined the Education Department. His teaching career commenced at Rushworth Higher Elementary School where he was from 1948-1952. He was then promoted to University High School (1953-1960) where he was soon recognised as a first-class teacher.



One his students, later Professor, Russell Lansbury noting him as an outstanding teacher also commented 'he read every student essay carefully but did not tell you what to think he posed questions- his interest was seminal'

A brilliant classroom teacher and pioneer in social studies and politics he had a scholarly breadth that saw him familiar with so much. He was well versed in the classics, Latin, modern literature and he was well versed in theology. He had a keen sense of humour and a dry wit but he was always modest and self-effacing.





### Vale – Dr Graeme Ivallan Duke (con't)

Graeme was at the school under three principals Thompson, Collins and Barberis but he is most well-known for his remarkable work as vice principal to Barberis.

The two of them combined to make a brilliant and effective combination. He was promoted to Vice-Principal in 1976. In his work as vice-principal he became a legendary figure. His voice and presence immediately had the attention of the students, who respected him greatly. He rejoiced in the nick name of "Snapper", for reasons unknown. Legend amongst the boys had him as a former boxer! He never had disciplinary problems.

Among his stories, was of a phone call reporting that a boy was ill and would be absent that day from school, asked who was speaking the reply was "It's my father speaking".

When Graeme Duke retired in 1986, Principal Lou Barberis said the debt to him was immense: he had administered a large and complex institution with apparent ease and his influence on staff and students was enormous. He was not only wise but his 'presence instilled respect' Barberis went on to say 'he brings to an exacting role a superb intellect, wisdom and long familiarity with and an inspired awareness of the unique character of MHS' and he showed 'unremitting dedication'.

He provided for staff and students important structures within which they could function and show creativity and achieve excellence.

Sadly, soon after he retired in 1987 his wife Sheila died. This was a grievous blow. He was a man of faith, and he then undertook study for a Doctorate. He was successful and became a Doctorate of Divinity, his thesis topic was Biblical criticism and the Protestant Churches in Victoria 1850-1900.

Graeme retained a keen interest in the school was a regular at school and old boy events and was a key figure in the writing of the history of the school as well as the centenary celebrations. A real scholar in retirement he undertook much scholarly work.

Not only was Graeme Duke one of the great figures in the history of MHS but one of the most loved.

He truly Honoured the Work.

### **Farewell to Retiring Teachers**

In league with MHS, we acknowledge the extraordinary contribution of longstanding teachers. We thank them for their many years of service and wish them well in retirement.



Saki Ganella O.A.M. Maths / 415 Squadron AAFC MHS student 1962 – 65 Staff member 1971 – 2021

In cinema mythology very few sequels are as good as the original. Movie buffs generally confer that an exception to the rule is the Godfather Part II, a good segue to Saki Ganella's career with Forrest House and 415 Squadron Australian Air Force Cadets.

I refer you to Gordon Lowing's excellent tribute to Saki Ganella in the 2002 Unicorn when Saki first retired. In summary, Saki had been at 15 Flight Air Training Corps, as it was known then, as a student from 1962 to 1965. He came back as a MHS Staff member in 1971 and served as the Chief Instructor of 15 Flight till 1985, when he became the Commanding Officer until 1985, reverting to Chief Instructor until he retired from the Australian Air Force Cadets in 2002. His time as Commanding Officer has been recognized this year with the commissioning of a ceremonial sword for 415SQN named after him.



As a House co-ordinator during this period, he was unparalleled in his influence. His time first as a Co-ordinator for Forrest from 1973 to 1987 and of Yarra from 1994 to 2001, 23 years in total, is the equal longest as a house co-ordinator in the modern history of MHS. But his leadership to 13 wins in the house competition is unrivalled. When he came back to MHS in 2004 he became "The Godfather" of Forrest House and has remained the defining figure of the Forrest Tribe over the last 18 years. There is a Greek word for passion- pathos, Saki illustrated this, writ large, when he was commanding the Forrest choral rehearsals, always demanding the best performance from Forrest's young men.





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For my perspective, Saki was my Year 12 Mathematics teacher at MHS. He is quoted as saying: "Mathematics runs in the blood of the Greeks. I tell my students that Pythagoras was my uncle and quite a few of them believe it", that passion for mathematics came through in his teaching. As my Commanding Officer of Air Cadets, Saki illustrated that elusive leadership trait of Command Presence.

As both a student and junior member of staff of Forrest during his time as Forrest House Coordinator, I would like to say that Saki was a mentor. However, that scowl, the finger point, the intensity of his focus, the emotional ferocity; like his fellow Melbourne Football Club tragic, Ron Barassi, they possess talents that cannot be taught, just humbly admired.

In 2020 Saki George Ganella was recognised in the Queen's Birthday Honours List with an OAM for his service to education in all aspects of Melbourne High School.

After 50 years of service at Melbourne High School, I wish him the all the best in his welldeserved second retirement, and that for him "The Godfather: Part III" will the perfect end to his trilogy.

Visual Arts Staff member 1986 – 2021

We say goodbye to Mihaela, who has worked at MHS for 35 years – and in doing so is one of the school's longest serving art teachers, and its longest serving female teacher. Mihaela completed a double major in Painting and Art History at Phrahan Tech (now VCA) and graduated in 1978.

She started her career at MHS in 1985 after having previously taught at Flemington High School. She quickly became involved in a range of activities such as the school play where she was head of costume design and also became age group leader of Como house.







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Mihaela was instrumental in the proposal for the design and development of the MHS Arts Centre, in both helping secure funding for construction and overseeing the design of a 21st century specialised centre for the visual and performing arts. Mihaela has spent her career as an artist first, with her continued practice in art making and exhibiting serving as an ongoing source of inspiration for her students. With every VCE student she took the time to personalise her teaching, discovering unique forms of expression that motivated them to create their best work – which was visible for all to see in our yearly arts show.

As head of Art and the Visual and Performing Arts from 2010 to 2017, Mihaela was a strong advocate for the faculty and always fought hard to ensure that a diverse range of subjects ran in the face of enrolment fluctuations. She oversaw the implementation of several new curricula and worked tirelessly with every staff member to to support them and their subject area.

Mihaela has led our faculty with both her heart and her head, and genuinely cares about the wellbeing of each staff member, going above and beyond to help wherever she can. She has had such an impact on the arts at MHS that we present a yearly award in her name, The Mihaela Brysha Arts Award, that embodies her spirit of creativity and passion.

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**Dr Anne Lierse** Music Staff member 1995 – 2021

I find it hard to put into words the enormous impact Dr Anne Lierse has had upon Music at Melbourne High School, because what she has done for Music Education in Victoria and Australia has far surpassed her amazing efforts at MHS.

Anne joined the staff of Melbourne High School in 1995 after leaving Blackburn High School. During her time at MHS she taught piano at an exceptionally high level, she conducted the School Orchestra, she mentored Chamber Music ensembles, she taught classroom music, and was Director of Music from 2004 until 2010.



While one might marvel at her achievements within the MHS setting, Anne has been a passionate advocate for Music Education in Victoria and Australia, arguing for increased funding for all schools so that they can run effective music programs. She has sat on and written articles for Parliamentary Reviews, she helped design VCE Music Study Designs, and worked tirelessly with organisations such as the Victorian Music Teachers Association (VMTA), the Association for Music Educators (ASME), the Australian Society of Music Educators (aMuse) to help enhance and further Music Education for all schools.

Anne has been an advocate for Australian Music, with her students and her ensembles championing and performing the works of Australian composers. She was the Director of Music when MHS won the Future Leader in Australian Music Education award from ABC Classic FM in 2009. Her piano students have won awards and competitions in Australia and abroad, and a significant number have gone on to become professional musicians and teachers. One indicator of her amazing teaching ability and her positive impact on her students is the high numbers of piano playing Old Boys who regularly attend the recitals of the current students.





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Thanks to all of Anne's work in advocating for Music Education she has been awarded a Fellowship of ASME, Life Memberships of aMuse and the VMTA, and in 2019 she was nominated for the Senior Australian of the Year and awarded the ASME Music Educating for Life Award.

MHS has been incredibly privileged to have had the benefit of Anne's experience and passion for Music Education. Her students, both past and present, have benefited enormously from her expertise.

From speaking with Anne, I am in awe of her phenomenal insights into Music Education. #### The Lowest Depths by Ross Fitzgerald & Ian McFadyen

Hybrid Publishers, Melbourne 2021 Reviewed by Dr Alan Gregory

### Graham Green's term "An Entertainment", probably best sums up this beautifully produced book.

*The Lowest Depths* is a very good read, with equal elements of a socio-politico farce and of a spy thriller, plus a touch of sci-fi!

As with its predecessor, *The Dizzying Heights,* this book featuring Dr Professor Grafton Everest is written by two Melbourne High School Old Boys – Ross Fitzgerald and Ian McFadyen. Ross Fitzgerald AM is Emeritus Professor of History & Politics at Griffith University. Known throughout Australia as a long-term sober alcoholic, Fitzgerald is the author, co-author or editor of 43 books and numerous articles and reviews, many of which regularly appear in *The Australian* newspaper and *The Weekend Australian*.



Ian McFadyen is a writer, actor and television producer who has created several successful television series, books and plays. He is remembered by many for his role in the TV series "The Comedy Company", in which he sometimes appeared, unforgettably, as Sir David Rabbitborough.

This is the eighth Grafton Everest adventure. While the two most recent were co-written with McFadyen, for two of the others Fitzgerald had different collaborators.

The scene-setting, opening chapters of *The Lowest Depths* remind the reader that Grafton Everest was for many years an academic at the University of Mangoland. But he became a Federal parliamentarian holding the balance of power. And then, Senator Everest became the first President of the Republic of Australia.



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We find Everest at a Writers Festival. The book will have special appeal to those who experienced the age before writers' festivals, modern supermarkets, and what really constitutes academic research. There are superb digs at political correctness – not only colour-blind testing for parts in films and plays but also gender-blind testing! Yes, Black Lives May Matter but also Green and Orange ones. In this novel, new dog breeds include Goldhunds and Rottcollies. There are also First Nation Paleo-food and many other gastronomic delights.

Grafton Everest is extremely lost trying to cope at home without his much-loved wife Janet, who is travelling overseas with a group of all-female friends on a twenty-six-city world tour. The section describing Everest's first venture into a modern supermarket is hilarious, as he is bewildered by the whole place and especially the mysteries of self-serve checkouts. Indeed, most modern technology is beyond him.

Then comes the arrival from America of his pregnant, vegan daughter Lee-Anne, her husband Wayne Singlet and their son Justice, as it transpires, to live with Grafton on his own. Lee-Anne wisely calls in Nanny Neal to look after Justice and bring the house into order, but Neal has now become an urban-survivalist.

Grafton, with nothing much to do, is persuaded to start researching his autobiography. Doing so, he uncovers ambiguous information about his own birth and ancestry, with a strange suggestion of a Russian connection.

Then the Australian government invites him to be a delegate to a United Nations team investigating the recent election, as President for Life of Russia, one Valdimir Putrid. (In other parts of *The Lowest Depths,* we become aware of American Presidents George Bosh and Ronald Thump). Confusing Grafton Everest with another academic, Australian government officials believe he is fluent in Russian, which of course he is not.

So begins a thriller – which takes Everest to Russia. It includes an enthralling trip on the Trans-Siberian Railway and many amazing and surreal adventures.

A key character in the book is Mr Lee Horton, Grafton's "former high school science teacher, erstwhile father-in-law, former spy and lifelong mentor". Horton is, in part, based on the late legendary Melbourne High School teacher Norton Hobson and, in part, on Fitzgerald's sponsor in Alcoholics Anonymous, the late Lee Parry, who was the advertising manager of Radio 3AW.





In real life, Norton Hobson was an eccentric but brilliant teacher at Melbourne High, who had a major impact on everyone he taught, including one-time Australian foreign minister Gareth Evans and Ross Fitzgerald himself.<sup>[1]</sup>

In *The Lowest Depths,* Mr Horton is able to clone himself into various forms and follow Everest wherever he goes, getting him out of several serious scrapes. Indeed, in all eight Grafton Everest adventures, Mr Horton is crucial to Everest's well-being and sometimes to his survival.

The characters, all of whom are Fitzgerald's creations, are caricatures. But they are well-drawn, and the latest Grafton Everest entertainment is absorbing, if to the literalist sometimes implausible.

Mention by Fitzgerald and McFadyen in their latest offering of another book, *The Da Vinci Code,* gives a hint of some of the flavour of these current adventures.

*The Lowest Depths* is both extremely well-written and utterly enthralling.

Embrace the improbability and enjoy!

Colin Axup – MHS 1984 Principal, Suzanne Cory High School

#### **New President of VASSP**

We congratulate Colin Axup on his appointment as President of the Victorian Association of Secondary Schools earlier this year.

Having completed a Bachelor of Arts (Hons.) and a Diploma of Education at Monash University and then a Graduate Diploma Strategic Studies at the Australian National University, Colin began his teaching career at Melbourne High School in 1992. His subjects included history, politics and international relations.

Over the next 19 years Colin held various leadership positions, including house master, rowing master, coordinator of history, sailing and water polo. As a leading teacher he was a year level coordinator, student leadership coordinator and registrar.



In 1991, Colin was commissioned into the Australian Army Reserves and in 1994, he was appointed Commanding Officer of the Melbourne High School Cadet Unit. He held this role for 17 years until his resignation at the end of 2010. In 2001, Colin joined the newly formed national headquarters of the Australian Army Cadets and served for the next 10 years culminating in his appointment as Deputy Commander of the Australian Army Cadets from 2007 to 2010 in the rank of Colonel (AAC).

In 2011, Colin was appointed to Williamstown High School as Assistant Principal and in 2013 he was appointed Principal of Stawell Secondary College in the Grampians region of Victoria. In 2013, Colin completed a Master of School Leadership at the University of Melbourne. Then in 2015, Colin was appointed Principal of Suzanne Cory High School which is located in the western Melbourne suburb of Werribee. The school is one of Victoria's four select entry high schools.

#### **GLITTERATI: 1 photographer | 1,100 subjects | 974 images on display** Powerhouse Museum, Sydney – 11 October 2021 to 19 June 2022

Robert Rosen is one of Australia's foremost social photographers. Over four decades he's attended parties, concerts, fashion events and nightclubs across London, Europe and Australia, capturing the rich, famous and fabulous for the social pages of a slew of local and international newspapers and magazines.

Defying the image of the pushy, intrusive paparazzi, Rosen was polite and discreet, earning the trust of his subjects to make them forget he was actually working as he drank champagne, networked and juggled the three cameras slung around his neck.

A participant observer, he favoured the spontaneity of the unobtrusive auto-focus camera which enabled him to capture intimate portraits that convey the mood and energy of the times.

#### Archive

1490 items have been catalogued this year. Notable donations include:

- Two cigarette cards of Alec McKenzie when he played for Geelong, later Teacher, Sports Master and Vice Principal of the School

- Anne Hyde donated a collection of material relating the New Building Appeal from her father Albert Kopman MHS 1934-1935
- Dr Anne Lierse donated a significant collection relating to music at MHS.

#### Outreach

The Archivist attended several meetings, briefing the GM&B Patrons Club on the activities of the Archives.

- Numerous articles and obituaries have been written for the Old Boys' newsletter.
- Honours. The Australia Day and Queens' Birthday Honours Lists were cross checked against the student database, identify a significant number of Old Boys' who received Honours this year.

#### **New Principal**

Dr Mordini, the new principal, has shown interest in the school's history and the archives. Early in the year he was given a formal tour of the Heritage Room as well as the Storeroom under Room 9 (T29), before meeting the Historian and Archivist to discuss future directions.

#### Research

 The researching of former students has progressed well, with all students who entered upto 1950 (plus the 1960's) having been researched through publicly available online resources, such as the National Archives and Trove. The release of the Teachers' Rolls (1860's to 1960's) on the PROV's upgraded website has made available a wealth of material.

#### Scanning

Most school publications have now been scanned, allowing much easier access, and for text searching. Next will be scanning photos and other items.

**Charles Arblaster** was in the second class at Duntroon and joined the A.I.F. directly. He served at Gallipoli with the Light Horse where he was wounded and promoted to Captain. He was then transferred to the 53<sup>rd</sup> Infantry Battalion when it went to France.

At the battle Of Fromelles, he was the senior surviving officer of the Battalion, which he took charge of.

Seriously wounded, he could not be evacuated when the attack failed, and he died of his wounds. Charles' actions were deserving of a medal, possibly even a Victoria Cross, but the death of all senior officers precluded any recommendation being written. Liz donated Charles' **Duntroon Badge (pictured above)**, a very special item. Further information on Charles is available at: <u>https://fromelles.info/soldiers/captain-charles-arblaster/</u>. ### Dr Liz Rushen Visits the Archives (con't)

**Dorothy Clack** attended Spring Street for a year before the school split, staying at Melbourne Girls' High School before she attended Williamstown High School. She then completed a business course and undertook office work before enlisting during WWII in the Navy. A Telegraphist, she served at Cerberus and Harman. After the war, she established the Parramatta Secretarial Services before in 1960 joining the Australian Baptist Union as a journalist in Sydney.

She returned to Melbourne after her father's death, again working for the Baptist Board, in an Editor/Author of a number of books on religion. She was the first President of the Victorian Baptist Business and Professional Women's Association, editor of the ICBA Herald for 5 years, and State President of the Australian Church Women (Victorian Unit).

Dorothy was also a telephone counsellor with Lifeline, secretary of the Collins Street Baptist Church and Baxter Village.

Pictured right, Liz donated her Aunt's war medal (the first received by the school of an Old Girl) still in its box, a photo of Dorothy in Uniform, her books of daily devotions and several other items.

One is a photo of a Japanese street scene, presumably from the Occupation period. Dorothy is believed to have been engaged to a soldier, though she never married. The photo may have been sent to her whilst he was serving in the B.C.O.F.
