The year has concluded with some excellent achievements across all domains. Academically, our VCE results were stellar, in NAPLAN we were the highest performing Government secondary school in Victoria, and in several national and international competitions our students have been outstanding.

On the latter point, I wish to acknowledge Oliver Downing (below) who has recently returned from the International Science Olympiad. Olly was one of six Australians chosen and the only one to return with a gold medal. In acknowledging his success, I wish to thank the Melbourne High School Foundation for their financial support. Their generous gift helped cover some of Olly's travel expenses.



Our achievements have also been noteworthy in many other areas including the arts, sport and community service. These are very important adjuncts to our academic program and something we are committed to. It is through these activities that we continue to graduate young people who are more equipped for their future studies, work, community engagement and family life.

NAPLAN and VCE Results

As noted, our NAPLAN results were excellent and as reported in the media, we were the highest performing Government secondary school. Our VCE results were also impressive and attracted lots of media attention. Our highlights included:

Oliver Bao (99.95)


- 53 students achieved an ATAR of 99 or above which represents 14.72% of the cohort. (N=360)
- (In 2022, 33 students achieved the same result and this figure represented approximately 11% of the cohort.)
- Median ATAR 94.7 (It was the same in 2022)
- Average 91.59 (In 2022 it was 91)

Median study score – 36 Percentage of study scores of 40 and over – 27.9

Remembering John Grigsby



John Raymond James Grigsby B.A.(Hons.), Dip.Ed. 10 August 1940 – 11 August 2023 MHS Staff 1964 – 1993

Studying a Bachelor of Arts in history, John was awarded Honours for a thesis on the leadership of the Catholic Church under Archbishop Gould (he would go on to write several entries for the Australian Dictionary of Biography on notable Catholics).

As an undergraduate at the University of Melbourne, John lived at Newman College. He would go on to become History Tutor and Senior Tutor at Newman, a role he held for several years including during his early years of teaching at Melbourne High School.

After he completed his Diploma of Education he was appointed to Melbourne High School as teacher of History. He became master in Charge of Debating, and the following year was promoted, and also took charge of the Cadet Unit's Q Store as Captain.

From 1967 he was second in Command of the Cadet Unit to Major Munday and also in charge of the Rifle Shooting team. In 1969 he was promoted to Major and to Officer in Charge of the Cadets, a position he held until 1981, and resumed 1985-1987. The Dress and Drill competition trophy is named after him.








Remembering John Grigsby (con't)

John was a major figure in the school during a turbulent time. The late 1960's saw a push for change away from the traditions of the past, culminating in the Strike of 1971. John, along with several other key staff ensured that academic standards remained high; that the co-curricular side of the school continued; and that the cadets kept going following defunding by the Whitlam government.

He authored several history text books, including The Turbulent Years (a history of Australia 1770-1980) and An Atlas of Australian History. For the staff revue in the late 1970's he played a very convincing Queen Victoria.





John maintained an active role in curriculum development and assessment of History both at Melbourne High School and at a state level. He was History Co-ordinator at MHS for many years. In this role, he was a positive and valued mentor for many young teachers within the History Department. He was also an examiner for Eighteenth Century History under VUSEB and VISE, working closely with colleagues from both government and independent schools. John was promoted to Fifth Form level Co-ordinator in 1982, and to Year 12 Level Co-Ordinator in 1986.

After time away on long service leave in 1990, he became the Co-ordinator for the new VCE in 1991. This was a challenging role, with the change from an exam based single year HSC, to a two-year course, based around school-based assessment. John was also Staff Rep on School Council for two years.



Remembering John Grigsby (con't)

At the end of 1993 he took a redundancy package and retired early to Geelong. He was a donor of Speech Night prizes from his retirement (Information Management, Heritage and/or Cadets).

At his request there was no funeral, and he was cremated. Part of his ashes were interned at the Geelong Eastern Cemetery and the remainder to be interned at Newman College. Attended by over 80 guests, a farewell was held at the Old Boys' Pavilion following the School's Annual Cadet Parade.






VCE Exam MasterClass

Jack Pease was at the heart of the British Liberal government from 1908 to 1915, as Chief Whip through two general elections, and an member of the Cabinet confronting domestic tumult, international tensions, and war. Pease was an unassuming participant in the deliberations of a formidable gathering of political talent. His journals as President of the Board of Education from 1911 to the formation of the coalition ministry in 1915 are a closely observed, unvarnished record of what he saw and heard in Downing St and Westminster: constitutional and Home Rule crises, industrial conflict, electoral reform, women's suffrage controversies, budget struggles, naval estimates, and foreign policy. Despite his Quaker beliefs, Pease committed to supporting war against Germany, his troubled conscience is laid bare in letters to his wife and friends. Replete with intimate portraits of his revered chief H. H. Asquith and the Prime Minister's social circle, the journals also provide evocative observations of the contest of ideas, arguments, and moods of prominent contemporaries, especially David Lloyd George as Chancellor of the Exchequer, Winston Churchill as Home Secretary then First Lord of the Admirialty, and Lord Kitchener as Secretary of State for War. Pease's accounts are augmented by the diaries and letters of others privy to Cabinet policy secrets and personal rivalries. With a biographical introduction, extensive explanatory commentaries, and bibliographical guidance, Pease's text provides a uniquely comprehensive understanding of Asquith's Liberal government.

Remembrance Day



At the start of war in September 1939, fighting was limited and far away from Melbourne. It would be 8 months before the 'phoney' war turned hot, and Australians saw action. In Melbourne it would take the invasion of Malaya in December 1941 for war to directly threaten Australia.

At Melbourne High School, trenches were dug in case of air-raids (which then had to be dug a second time when the school was moved to Camberwell and Malvern). Across Melbourne, Air Raid Wardens were appointed, watch kept at night for fires caused by air-raids, drills to extinguish incendiary bombs and evacuating wounded were carried out.

Looking back these preparations might have seemed un-necessary, the Japanese after all were a long way away. But the repeated bombing of Darwin, the shelling of Sydney and Newcastle, the invasion of New Guinea and then Papua, and the flight by a Japanese plane over Melbourne, made attack seem imminent.

To assist, a Civil Defence Day was held on Saturday 4 September 1943, a parade was held through the city and before the focus shifted to Flemington Racecourse. Around 60,000 spectators watched 10,000 civil defence volunteers march past dignitaries and to watch a display, including a 'bombing' by plane.

The R.A.A.F. used two American divebombers, the Vultee Vengeance, escorted by Spitfires. Two runs were made, dummy bombs were dropped, explosions on the ground simulated an actual attack, which the Civil Defence Volunteers responded too. After the second run, one of the planes appeared to start a victory roll but remained flying low before disappearing behind Kensington hill. A column of black smoke rose shortly after.

The plane had passed low over Macauley Railway station (where a number of passengers were waiting) and crashed into the Victorian Wheatgrowers' Corporation warehouse and mill beside the railway line.

The Wireless Air-Gunner was James Noel Harris, who had attended Melbourne High School in 1932-1933. He and the pilot were killed.

He is buried at Springvale War Cemetery, alongside nine other Old Boys (including two contemporaries). Deaths in flying accidents were common during WWII. Of 219 old boys serving in the R.A.A.F. when they died, 81 were accidental deaths (120 were killed in action).

A detailed article was published in the LaTrobe Society Journal and is available on the State Library of Victoria website.

James was born in Richmond in 1917, he attended

James left after completing fourth form, finding work as a buyer and sales engineer before enlisting with the R.A.A.F. on 2 September 1940.

He qualified as a Wireless Air-Gunner. He married Zena Henrietta Langley in 1941, they had one daughter. After training, he served in 7 Squadron (October-December 1942), which flew Bristol Beaufort's out of Townsville escorting shipping across Northern Australia. He was promoted to Pilot Officer in April 1943 and was based at Laverton when he died.

"People tell me they would never hit their partner. That's not enough".

In July, five women have allegedly been murdered in Australia by men they knew. The loss their families and loved ones will be currently experiencing, and the pain of seeking justice, is a burden I know all too well.

My sister Niki was murdered by her vengeful and controlling partner, who decided that because she was planning to end their relationship, she didn't have the right to be with anybody else.

That was eight years ago and when I think of Niki now, I always remember how she approached each day with optimism and an infectious positive energy. I'm sure that on her last night alive, she went to sleep looking forward to tomorrow, hopeful for a future free from her partner's abuse.

But that future never came.

While she slept, Niki's killer stabbed her to death using a meat cleaver from their kitchen drawer. He butchered her so severely that when I was tasked with confirming that the lifeless corpse in front of me was in fact hers, there wasn't much for me to go on.

Since Niki's murder, I have been campaigning to tell Australia that what happened to her, and countless other murdered women, can be prevented.

But how? What can we do to stop this scourge?

From my sister Niki's experience and the lived experiences and expertise of victimsurvivors and sector experts, one thing has become clear: violence that ends in murder rarely begins that way.

For the overwhelming majority of women who are murdered by an intimate partner, that final act of violence was not the first – even if earlier instances hadn't been reported to authorities, support services or family and friends.

As a country, we must educate ourselves about the warning signs of non-physical abuse. We need to be aware of the red flags that – when left unchecked – can and often do escalate. And we need to take those signs more seriously.

As an anti-violence campaigner, people often tell me that they would never hit their partner. While that's a positive statement, it seems that "not hitting your partner" sets the bar awfully low for what we consider to be acceptable relationship behaviour.

Not hitting your partner should be a given, but so should addressing behaviours grounded in power and control. And learning about these behaviours from those who have lived experiences of them is a necessary step Australia needs to take if we are to curb the startling rates of domestic violence in this country.

Niki's killer was one of those men who used non-physical abuse to intimidate her long before things turned physical. The abuse started with him controlling every aspect of her life. Niki was the primary breadwinner, yet he maintained strict control over household spending and kept her to a budget, threatening her if she spent money on things she wanted.

He decided who she was "allowed" to talk to and spend time with. Niki was forbidden from seeing family and friends and slowly isolated from her support networks, trapping her with a man who wore her down until he ultimately murdered her.

Following Niki's murder, I have met thousands of victim-survivors across the country through my advocacy work. And one thing has become abundantly clear – non-physical abuse often manifests in subtle ways that are designed to mask its true nature.

Perpetrators disguise their sinister motives behind seemingly innocuous actions and statements, which makes it harder for victim-survivors to articulate the abuse they are experiencing. For people outside the relationship, it can be hard to recognise why something might feel *off*.

We've become so used to hearing about common relationship tropes early on in someone's new relationship and thinking, 'Aww, isn't that just so romantic?!' when some of those behaviours aren't romantic at all – they're jealous, pseudo-caring comments and questions intended to control another person.

Technological abuse can start similarly. What begins with a seemingly innocent offer to set up a social media account or a new device can be used as a way to get their partner's login and track their online activity.

New technologies that <u>allow perpetrators to monitor their partner's movements</u> in realtime are of great concern. In some cases, electric cars are being tampered with by perpetrators to prevent their victims from driving a certain distance from their home.

Financial abuse is yet another area of control that we are only beginning to grasp the extent of. In fact, research estimates that it is present in 90 per cent of cases of intimate partner violence. The flow-on effects of money being taken, hidden or gambled without a partner's consent can mean that a victim-survivor is left without money for rent, basic necessities and even food for their children.

Many of these non-physical signs of abuse are underpinned by what's known as "coercive control" – a pattern of behaviour that an abuser uses to instil fear into their victim. And in the most tragic of cases, it can and does escalate into murder, even where there is no reported history of physical violence, as was the case of Hannah Clarke and her three children, Aaliyah, Laianah and Trey.

And the same thing happened to my sister Niki. Most cases don't make national headlines. When they do, it's only because the victim has been killed. There is a better way. For me, when it comes to the issue of domestic violence, I try to remain hopeful about the future.

During sentencing in the Supreme Court, Niki's killer's actions were seen as an act of such callous and unprovoked brutality that the judge who sentenced him said, "Nothing Nikita Chawla did in any way whatsoever contributed to what you chose to do to her."

The judge was right and I'm glad he made a point of saying it, but it's small comfort. I would rather a country where this is not happening with such painful regularity.


It would have been Nikita's birthday in June. For my family, and many other Australian families, it's too late for our loved one. Niki's life was stolen from her and we've lost her forever, but there's still a chance for us to help others.

Judging by the statistics, that help is needed by many Australians. We owe it to every one of them to listen. And act.
